

a look back at the record jackpot

At 3:09 p.m. on February 17, 2006, a Powerball ticket was sold at the U-STOP at 110 West O Street in Lincoln that would eventually make history.

The next night, that five-play quick pick ticket was found to have a

combination of numbers matching the winning numbers drawn for the largest Lotto prize in U.S. history.

As word spread, members of the media began arriving at the store.



Three days later, a group of eight coworkers at the ConAgra Foods plant in Lincoln claimed the record \$365 million jackpot from the February 18, 2006, Powerball drawing.

The group elected to take the cash option on the jackpot, valued at \$177.3 million. Their respective shares were \$22,162,500. After withholding of 25 percent federal and 5 percent state tax, they shared \$124.11 million or \$15.5 million, respectively.

The group was represented by Lincoln attorney, James H. Hoppe. Before an assembled crowd of hundreds, and a worldwide live media audience, the group



answered questions and received their big check from Governor Dave Heineman. Heineman noted the attention generated by the record jackpot and said, "I am pleased to have an opportunity to meet this lucky group of hardworking Nebraskans and present them with their share of these winnings."



"Ladies and gentlemen, life just got a bit more interesting for eight Nebraskans."

Members of the group told Nebraska Lottery officials that some of them have been playing Powerball for up to five years, pooling their resources to buy multiple tickets whenever the jackpot eclipses \$45 million. Each has contributed \$5 at a time to buy a total of eight five-play quick pick tickets for each drawing. They noted the irony of waiting to play when their respective shares of the prize after taxes will be just more than \$15 million, which is the minimum starting jackpot for Powerball.

Since claiming their prize, the winners have made a number of local business investments, and several area charities have benefitted from their generosity.

The odds of winning the Powerball jackpot are 1 in 146,107,962 while the overall odds are 1 in 36.60.

DID YOU KNOW?

Nine jackpots ranging from \$2.5 million to \$365 million have been won in Nebraska since the Nebraska Lottery began offering Powerball in July of 1994. The highest recorded Powerball jackpot was in February 2006 when a group of eight coworkers at the ConAgra Foods ham and corned beef plant in Lincoln split a \$365 million jackpot.

be designed and built by Orange County Choppers™ and signed by the Teutuls. The motorcycle prize is valued at \$87,857, which includes state and federal withholding paid by the Nebraska Lottery of \$4,300 and \$21,500 respectively.



Odds of winning the Orange County ChoppersTM top prize are 1 in 300,000 while the overall odds of winning are in 1 in 3.86.

The Orange County ChoppersTM Scratch game began shipping to Nebraska Lottery retailers in March.

Another chance to win a custom bike is to enter the "Roads to Riches" second chance promotion. During the months of March, April, May and June, players who send in \$10 worth of non-winning \$2 Scratch tickets will be entered for a chance to win a custom Orange County ChopperTM. The second-chance drawing will be held during

an event at the Nebraska State Fairgrounds on June 23.

As a special feature of the Roads to Riches OCC[™] Giveaway, the Teutuls of Orange County
Choppers[™] will appear on June 23 during the Power Up Biker Rally at State Fair Park in Lincoln. Upcoming Scratch Games:

The Nebraska Lottery has several new Scratch games coming up for spring and summer 2007.

10 Times Lucky, a new \$10 game, offers a top prize of \$200,000. The game offers low

overall odds (1 in 2.68) and the opportunity to multiply prizes by 10 times.

3D Tic Tac Toe is a \$3 Scratch game featuring a Tic Tac Toe play style. The top prize in 3D Tic Tac Toe is \$35,000; overall odds are 1 in 3.53. 3D Tic Tac Toe is scheduled to begin shipping to retailers this May.

The popular Truck\$ & Buck\$ Scratch game returns for an eleventh year with new prizes. The \$2 game will offer three top prizes of a 2007 Toyota Tundra 4x4 Double Cab truck. As in past years, a Truck\$ & Buck\$ second chance promotion is planned to accompany the Truck\$ & Buck\$ Scratch game, with a final contest drawing during the 2007 Nebraska State Fair. Look for the 2007 edition of Truck\$ and Buck\$ to ship to retailers starting in June.





Five Nebraska Lottery Players Win Cash Prizes in Holiday Promotion

Five semi-finalists drew for the chance to win up to \$12,000 during a special Nebraska Lottery event on January 18.

The Home-Free for the Holidays Promotion allowed Nebraska Lottery players to send in a combination of \$10 in non-winning holiday Scratch tickets for a chance to win one of five cash prizes from \$250 to \$12,000. Approximately 19,000 entries were received during the promotion in December 2006 and January 2007. The

Lottery held five preliminary drawings to select the five semi-finalists for the Grand Prize Drawing at the new Cabela's in La Vista.

After randomly choosing envelopes containing checks of various prize amounts, the five contestants opened the envelopes to reveal their prizes.

Pam Hasselman of Grand Island selected the Grand Prize of \$12,000. Hasselman told Nebraska

Lottery officials that she planned to use her prize to remodel her home.

Also receiving prizes were Shirley Kelley of Broken Bow (\$1,000), Lois Woods of Lincoln (\$750), Sherita Harlow of York (\$500), and Janita Seaman of Seward (\$250).



spotlight on central nebraska

Central Nebraska holds a variety of attractions for every visitor. From crane watching on the Platte to experiencing the history of Nebraska, there is something for everyone.

Bird Watching



Bring the binoculars because there are some excellent birdwatching locales in Nebraska. Each spring a multitude of migratory birds converge on the

Platte River Valley, and among them are half a million sandhill cranes.

Forbes magazine deemed Grand Island as the "#1 place in the world for bird-watchers" and it's easy to see why. Each year from mid-February to early-April, half a million cranes travel to the Grand Island and Kearnev area to rest and refuel as they complete their annual migration. The 60-mile stretch in central Nebraska along the Platte River transforms into a gathering place for the largest concentration of sandhill cranes in the world—nearly 80 percent of the world's population of sandhill cranes makes a stop in Nebraska. For many of the cranes, this long break comes in the middle of their 10,000-mile migration to Canada and the Arctic Circle.

Rowe Sanctuary and the Nebraska Bird Observatory at the Crane Meadows Visitors Center are two locations that offer a variety of tours and programs along with breathtaking views of these graceful birds. 

Carolyn Sharearm sat in disbelief as she watched the winning numbers 01, 04, 08, 11, 16 for the March 1, 2006 draw run across the screen. She couldn't have imagined that she had \$194,000 sitting in front of her on the coffee table. The winnings were in the form of a Nebraska Pick 5 ticket that she had purchased earlier that day. She had won smaller amounts in the past but nothing that large. Sharearem is a resident of Omaha and plans to use the winnings for a trip to Thailand. Nebraska Pick 5 from the Nebraska Lottery offers players four chances to win and has overall odds of 1:8. The odds of winning the Nebraska Pick 5 jackpot are 1 in 501.942.



Buying Diapers Turned Into A Winning Experience



Paul Warner of Alliance won \$20,000 playing 2by2 from the Nebraska Lottery. Warner purchased his ticket for the March 1, 2006 draw at his local Pamida while buying diapers. He found out he had won by calling the Nebraska Lottery Player's Hotline at 800-224-LUCK. Although his reaction was elated he was excited when it finally hit him that he had won. His plans for the winnings are to remodel his home and possibly buy a fifth wheel camper. 2by2

offers four ways to win with overall odds of 1 in 3.59. The odds of winning the Grand Prize are 1 in 105,625.



DID YOU KNOW?

There are currently 12 ethanol plants in Nebraska with a combined capacity of 676 million gallons per year. That creates a market for more than 300 million bushels of corn each year. Winning Ticket Hard to Believe

Mark Siske of Lincoln won \$138,000 playing Nebraska Pick 5 on May 5, 2006 but he didn't believe it. Siske visited the Nebraska Lottery website, nelottery.com, to check his numbers on the \$2 ticket he had purchased earlier that day at Osco Drug on South 48th Street. The ticket consisted of two plays. One play was his own numbers



and the other was a computer generated quick pick. The first set of numbers didn't match but the second set matched all five.

Not believing that he had the winning ticket, Siske said he checked the winning numbers at least four or five more times. Still in disbelief, he asked his wife to check the numbers. Having just woken up, she at first glance, thought the ticket was for the wrong date. A second look however confirmed that they had just won the game's top prize. The winning numbers were 05, 06, 07, 11 and 20.

Siske told Nebraska Lottery officials that he plans on using the winnings to pay bills, make a down payment on a house, and to go back to school to get his teaching certificate.

The overall odds of winning the Nebraska Pick 5 jackpot are 1 in 501,942. The odds of winning anything playing the game are 1 in 8.



Triple Play of the Day

Good things come in threes if you're Robert Moore of Ogallala. Moore who is an avid Nebraska Pick 3 player plays the same three sets of numbers every week, on three separate tickets.

On May 13, 2006 that strategy paid off with the winning numbers 5, 8 and 4. Because Moore selected the Straight/Box bet on each of his three tickets, each ticket was worth \$350 for a total prize of \$1,050.

Moore purchased his winning tickets from Pump & Pantry #19, 730 East 1st and Kwik Stop #8, 217 East 1st.

The odds of winning a \$350 Nebraska Pick 3 prize are 1 in 1,000 while the odds of winning any prize vary with the bet type selected.



Weekly Player Wins \$10,000 with Powerball



Buying a quick-pick Powerball ticket every week paid off for Mickey Stewart of Norfolk. Stewart matched four of the five white balls and the Powerball in the April 29, 2006 drawing to win \$10,000.

Stewart purchased the winning five dollar quickpick ticket at Shopper's Express, 810 Norfolk Avenue. The winning numbers for the April 29 Powerball

drawing were 19, 30, 35,40,41 and 14.

The odds of winning \$10,000 playing Powerball are 1 in 584,432.



\$150,000 Worth the Wait

Some things are worth the wait, as Elayne Morris of Omaha found out when she discovered that a free Nebraska Pick 5 quick pick ticket she received was worth \$150,000.

Morris won the free ticket for the June 27, 2006 draw at a Kabredlo's location near 56th & West Center in Omaha. The ticket contained the winning numbers 05, 16, 19, 21, 24 and was the only jackpot winning ticket sold. Because it was a free play, Morris said she didn't think about checking the numbers. It was several months before she realized that she had the winning ticket.

When Morris was claiming her prize at the Nebraska Lottery office, she told Nebraska Lottery officials that she screamed loudly when she found out she was a \$150,000 winner and stated that she was planning to use her winnings to pay bills.

The odds of winning the Nebraska Pick 5 jackpot are 1 in 501,942.



Twin Tickets Double Prize for Lincoln Man

Identical tickets lead to a double win for Jose Rodriguez of Lincoln, who won a total of \$2,300 playing Nebraska Pick 3.

Rodriguez purchased two tickets for the November 4, 2006 drawing at Michael Mart, 2801 NW 48th Street in Lincoln. Each ticket contained three plays using the winning numbers 0, 7, 0. Because he selected the Straight, Straight/Box and Box bet types respectively on the plays, each winning ticket was worth \$1,150 for a total of \$2,300.



Rodriguez is a regular Nebraska Lottery player and has previously won prizes playing Nebraska Pick 5 in addition to Nebraska Pick 3. When claiming his prize, Rodriguez told Nebraska Lottery officials that he couldn't believe he had won and that he planned to use his winnings for holiday gifts.

The odds of winning with the Straight/Box and Box bet are 1 in 1,000.



Osceola Woman Wins \$2,000 Playing Freezing Your Bucks Off

Helen Johnson of Osceola won \$2,000 playing the \$1 Scratch game Freezing Your Bucks Off.

Johnson is an occasional Nebraska Lottery player that purchases Scratch tickets when grocery shopping. She bought her winning Freezing Your Bucks Off ticket at the Country Market, 223 Vine Street in Silver Creek. The ticket contained matching dollar amounts for \$2,000. There are two \$2,000 prizes available in the game.



When claiming her prize on December 18, 2006, Johnson told Nebraska Lottery officials that at first she didn't know if she had won a prize, so she gave the ticket to a store clerk for validation. When they told her she had won \$2,000, she said it gave her "goose bumps." Johnson planned to use her winnings for holiday gifts.

The odds of winning a \$2,000 prize in Freezing Your Bucks Off were 1 in 720,000 while the overall odds of winning a prize were 1 in 3.59.



Omaha Woman Wins \$35,000



Martha Johanson of Omaha was pleasantly surprised on November 1, 2006 when she discovered that the \$3 Bonus Crossword Scratch ticket she purchased was worth the top prize of \$35,000. Johanson purchased the ticket at a Bag N Save location near 156th and Q Street in Omaha and originally thought the ticket was worth \$100. But after trying to redeem the ticket at the store, she realized that she had formed 10 words with the let-

ters on her Scratch ticket to win the \$35,000 prize.

Johanson is a regular player of Nebraska Lottery games, playing Powerball and Nebraska Pick 5 in addition to Scratch. When redeeming her prize, Johanson told Nebraska Lottery officials that she planned to use her winnings for family expenses and to support charitable causes during the upcoming holiday season.

The odds of winning the \$35,000 Bonus Crossword top prize are 1 in 960,000 while the overall odds of winning a prize in the game are 1 in

3.39.



Arcadia Man Wins \$7,000 Quick 7's Prize

Jamie Hurlburt of Arcadia won \$7,000 playing the \$1 Quick 7's

Scratch game from the Nebraska Lottery.

Hurlburt purchased his ticket at Fast Phil Plaza, 405 Second Ave in Kearney. When scratching the ticket, he revealed seven "7" symbols with corresponding prize amounts of \$1,000 for a total prize of \$7,000. There are three \$7,000 prizes in Quick 7's; Hurlburt was the final person to win the \$7,000 top prize in the (green) edition of the game.

When claiming his prize on December 11, 2006, Hurlburt told Nebraska Lottery officials that he is an occasional Scratch player and that this was the first time he had won a significant prize. He plans to purchase

a new car with his winnings.

Quick 7's is a \$1 Scratch game from the Nebraska Lottery that appeals to occasional players who pick games that are simple to play. The odds of winning the \$7,000 top prize in Quick 7's are 1 in 960,000 while the overall odds of winning a prize in the game are 1 in 3.60.



\$500,000 Scratch Prize Claimed by Two Seward Men

Two Seward men split the first \$500,000 top prize in the \$20 Scratch game \$500,000 Cash Jubilee.

Dean Schultz and Herbert Folkerts purchased four Cash Jubilee tickets around 8:30 am on December 12, 2000. They purchased the tickets at Gas N Snaks, 541 Jackson Avenue in Seward. One of the four tickets contained the matching numbers for a total prize of \$500.000.



Schultz and Folkerts wasted no time in claiming their prize; less than an hour later, they were at Nebraska Lottery headquarters. The two men told Nebraska Lottery officials that they were "excited" about their win and already had plans for the prize money. Schultz will use his share to purchase a new truck, a plasma television and to build a garage; Folkerts will use his share to pay bills.

\$500,000 Cash Jubilee is the first \$20 Scratch ticket from the Nebraska Lottery. There are two \$500,000 top prizes available in the game and a total of \$4 million in cash prizes. The odds of winning the \$500,000 top prize in Cash Jubilee are 1 in 150,000 while the overall odds of winning

are 1 in 3.25.



Lincoln Powerball Winner Doubles Prize with Power Play

Lincoln resident Cheston Coffin turned a \$10,000 winning Powerball ticket into \$20,000 by adding Power Play to his Powerball purchase. Coffin purchased the ticket for the November 1, 2006 drawing at a U-STOP location near 56th and Holdrege in Lincoln. The \$2 ticket contained one play with Power Play.



The Powerball numbers for the November 1 drawing were 7, 8, 13, 46, 54 and Powerball 35. Coffin matched 4 of the white ball numbers and the red Powerball number for \$10,000. But because he added the \$1 Power Play to his purchase, the prize amount was doubled by the Power Play ball number 2 for a total of \$20,000.

Coffin told Nebraska Lottery officials that he was excited about his win and plans on using his prize money to fund his upcoming wedding.

Adding Power Play does affect the odds of winning. The odds of winning \$10,000 playing Powerball are 1 in 584,432.



David City Man Wins \$20,000 2by2 Top Prize



Charles Dischinger of David City recently won the \$20,000 top prize in 2by2.

Dischinger purchased a multi-draw 2by2 ticket for the December 19 and 20, 2006 draws at Didier's Grocery, 340 D Street in David City. The ticket contained the winning red numbers 6, 9 and white numbers 5, 8 from the December 19 draw for a total prize of \$20,000. Over 120 players have won the 2by2 top

prize since 2002.

Dischinger is a regular Nebraska Lottery player that calls the Nebraska Lottery Player's Hotline (800-224-LUCK) every morning for the winning numbers. He told Nebraska Lottery officials that he was excited about his win and "probably woke up the neighbors" after discovering that he had won the \$20,000 prize. He plans to use his winnings to purchase a new vehicle.

2by2 is run by the Multi-State Lottery Association and was introduced in June 2002. Players in Kansas, Nebraska and North Dakota have the opportunity to win up to \$20,000 Monday through Saturday by playing 2by2. The odds of winning the \$20,000 2by2 top prize are 1 in 105,625.

\$1,000 E-10 Unleaded with Ethanol Winner

High gas prices seem to be affecting everyone, but one Nebraska Lottery Truck\$ & Buck\$ Scratch ticket player won some relief. Fredrick Trumpe of Clark won the game's second tier prize of \$1,000 worth of Ethanol-Enriched Fuel in June 2006.

Trumpe purchased his winning ticket at Kwik Stop located on Highway 30 in Clarks.

2006 marked the tenth anniversary of Truck\$ & Buck\$ and the first time three prizes of \$1,000 worth of Ethanol-Enriched Fuel appeared in the game's prize structure. The Ethanol-Enriched Fuel prizes are the result of a partnership between the Nebraska Lottery and the Nebraska Ethanol Coalition.

The odds of winning the game's second tier prize of Ethanol-Enriched Fuel were 1 in 280,000. The overall odds of winning anything playing the game were 1 in 3.67.



A Double Jackpot for Omaha Nebraska Pick 5 Player

A player who spreads around his buying of lottery tickets, bought the right ticket at the right time and the right place.

Lance Copeland of Omaha won the Nebraska Pick 5 Jackpot on the last day of February. The jackpot for February 28 was \$162,000 but, due to the February Nebraska Pick 5 Doubler promotion, the jackpot was doubled and Copeland took home a check worth \$324,000.



Copeland told Nebraska Lottery officials he normally buys one quick pick ticket when he stops to get gas, gum or pop. It was a stop for a bottle of pop at Bucky's Amoco, 102nd and Maple in Omaha that turned into a winning stop for him. His ticket contained all five winning numbers (02, 03, 08, 20, 27) for the Nebraska Pick 5 jackpot.

Copeland also told Nebraska Lottery officials that he's not a traveler so a trip is not in the plans for his winnings. He plans to pay off bills, help his son and is undecided what to do with the remainder. Nevertheless, he

said, "I'm sure I'll figure something out after this all sets in."

beneficiary update

The Nebraska Environmental Trust

In late March the Nebraska Lottery distributed among its beneficiary funds \$8,382,364 derived from a share of Scratch and Lotto ticket sales for the previous three months.

A total of \$281,408,168 has been distributed in quarterly transfers since the Nebraska Lottery began operation on September 11, 1993. The latest transfer, made the week of March 26, was distributed among beneficiaries in the following manner:

Education Innovation Fund, \$1,655,517; Nebraska Scholarship Fund, \$2,074,635; Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund, \$3,730,152; Nebraska State Fair Support and Improvement Fund, \$838,236; and Compulsive Gamblers

Assistance Fund, \$83,824.

Amendment 4 passed by Nebraska voters in November of 2004 established the following distribution formula: Education as directed by the Legislature (44.5 percent) - currently divided among the Education Innovation Fund and Nebraska Scholarship Fund; Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund



(44.5 percent); Nebraska State Fair (10 percent); and the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund (1 percent, plus the first \$500,000 in fund proceeds each fiscal year).

The funds' respective totals to date are:

Education Innovation Fund, \$110,730,177;

Nebraska Scholarship Fund, \$21,362,720;

Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund, \$113,631,901;

Nebraska State Fair Support and Improvement Fund, \$5,993,291; and

Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund, \$6,145,259.

Prior to July 1, 1997, the Solid Waste Landfill Closure Assistance Fund received proceeds totaling \$18,460,996. In 2004, the Legislature directed that a one-time transfer of \$5 million be made to the State General Fund.

Criteria for proceeds distribution are established by the beneficiary funds in accordance with legislative mandates. Every county in Nebraska has received service through grants funded with Nebraska Lottery proceeds.

The Nebraska Lottery marked \$1 billion in total sales (since 1993) in March of 2006.

Among the various efforts funded by Nebraska Lottery proceeds is the Nebraska Scholarship Fund, which is administered by the Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education under the Nebraska Scholarship Act.



Commission for Post-Secondary Education approves the students and distributes funds to the institutions. Grants are made based on financial need, and students are not guaranteed to receive the grant every year they are enrolled

With the help of the Nebraska Lottery, the Nebraska Scholarship Act has been able to award more than 25,000 Nebraska State Grants to college students at dozens of Nebraska institutions.

Grants were made to 12,139 students during the 2004-05 Academic Year. With grants averaging \$687, a total of \$8,336,903 was distributed to students attending 42 different institutions of higher education in Nebraska.

Among the students who received 2004-05 grants, 8,400 attended a public institution; 2,307 attended an independent college or university; and 1,432 attended a private for profit institution.

During the 2003-04 Academic Year, a total of 13,031 students received grants. Grant awards were divided evenly between dependent (traditional) and independent (nontraditional) students, with the average grant being worth \$671.

The 2003-04 grants helped students at 42 institutions of higher education across the state. These institutions included: all the state's 14 public 4-year and 2-year institutions, 12 private for profit institutions, and 16 private independent colleges.

Schools select students as potential recipients, and the Coordinating

The maximum grant that could be awarded during the 2004-05 Academic Year was \$2,389, which was the equivalent of 50 percent of fees and tuition for a full-time Nebraska resident undergraduate student at the University of Nebraska Lincoln (UNL). The maximum for the 2003-04 Academic Year was \$1.032, which was the equivalent of 25 percent of tuition and mandatory fees at UNL. For grants made to students for Academic Year 2005-06, the Legislature has set the maximum possible grant at 50 percent of fees and tuition at UNL.

The Nebraska Scholarship Fund uses a blend of funding from the United States Department of Education's LEAP/SLEAP program (7 percent in 2004-05, 12 percent in 2003-04), the State of Nebraska General Fund (68.5 percent in 2004-05, 65.5 percent in 2003-04), and Nebraska Lottery proceeds (24.5 percent in 2004-05, 22.5 percent in 2003-04).

Nebraska Lottery proceeds are being used in many ways to help people and projects across our state, supporting efforts focused on areas such as education, the environment, compulsive gamblers assistance, and the Nebraska State Fair. So far, \$280 million has been raised for Nebraska Lottery beneficiary funds.

Pheasant hunters have a passion for their sport. With its diverse upland game bird numbers, Nebraska is a featured destination for hunters from across the country. In Nebraska, 114,000 pheasant

hunters annually generate over \$41.8 million for the state's economy. To ensure that upland wildlife remains a part of our landscape, Pheasants Forever (PF) has established thousands of acres of habitat for pheasants, quail and other wildlife with the assis-

tance of the Nebraska Environmental Trust.


Local PF chapters are working with landowners to establish highquality habitat on the corners of center pivot irrigated fields. Through the Corners for Wildlife program, these less-productive areas can provide needed habitat for Nebraska wildlife when planted with grasses, shrubs and trees. Willing landowners sign a five-year contract and receive an annual rental payment and cost-share assistance. By the end of the contract, the landowner has a complete wildlife habitat area and the knowledge to maintain it in the future.

Benefits of the Corners for Wildlife are numerous; restored corners provide food and cover for a variety of Nebraska birds and wildlife, reduce soil erosion and protect water supplies from agricultural runoff. The Corners for Wildlife program has been highly successful, with landowner demand exceeding the available projects

each year. The Nebraska Environmental Trust has provided support for the Corners for Wildlife program since 1994. Trust funding allowed for the enrollment of 185 corners in 2006, the most projects ever enrolled in a single year. To date over 6,698 acres of habitat have been plant-

ed on 1,183 projects by local PF chapters and their partners.

PF chapters have also partnered with the Nebraska Environmental Trust to purchase no-till grass drills for wildlife habitat plantings. A notill grass drill is needed to handle the fluffy seeds associated with many grasses, wildflowers, forbs and legumes used in habitat plantings. This specialized equipment is typically unavailable for most landowners in the state. Trust funding has allowed for the purchase of 45 no-till drills across Nebraska since 1994, resulting in the establishment of over 67,000 acres of habitat across the state.
