# nebraska's living tree museum

## Beautiful Arbor Lodge beckons history and horticulture enthusiasts.

To newcomers, it's a jarring juxtaposition:
Nebraska, once described as a treeless desert, became the home of Arbor Day, now an international holiday celebrating trees.

The roots of the transformation are in Nebraska City, where Julius

Sterling Morton and his wife, Caroline, settled in 1854. Morton saw great agricultural and horticultural potential in Nebraska and promoted it through his position as editor of the local newspaper and a rigorous tree-planting program on his own land.

In 1872, a state resolution offered by Morton established April 10 as a tree-planting day. Two years later the Nebraska Board of Agriculture awarded prize money to counties and individuals who properly planted the largest number of trees. Though the date has changed through the years, Arbor Day has become a Nebraska fixture and is now celebrated in every state and many other countries.

In addition to this powerful, transforming idea, the Morton legacy to the state includes Arbor Lodge, a 65-acre historical park and arboretum in Nebraska City which was the Morton family home. The focal point of the park today is the Morton mansion, a stately, 52-room,

neo-colonial structure completed in 1903 by Joy Morton, the family's oldest son and founder of the Morton Salt Company. Joy Morton and his family used the mansion as a summer retreat until 1923 when he donated the house and grounds to the state.

The arboretum is a peaceful, aesthetically pleasing park, especially in summer months, and a living museum of woody pants including some specimens planted by J. Sterling Morton and his family more than 100 years ago. The collection includes 260 species, which are identified and labeled.

A half-mile walking path guides visitors through original arboretum trees, including a stand of American chestnuts, which escaped a fungal disease that virtually wiped out the species in its native eastern forests. To the east, there are four large, old Osage orange specimens, which are thought to be remnants of a hedgerow planted when the land was farmed. The grounds also include a fishpond, a gazebo, an Italian terraced rose garden and a new arboretum tract. Interpretive signs throughout the arboretum provide information for visitors.

The Morton mansion began as a four-room, L-shaped, frame structure in 1855. It was expanded with

four additions. The last alterations, made by Joy Morton in 1902, included adding the neo-colonial façade and stuccoing the entire house.

Most of the authentic Victorianand Empire-style furnishings in the home were owned by the Mortons. There are numerous examples of Tiffany glass, including an ornate skylight in a sun parlor. The house has hand-carved woodwork and hardwood floors.

Nineteenth century horse-drawn

vehicles – coaches, carriages and surreys – and an Overland stage-coach are on display in the carriage house.

For those interested in history or horticulture, Arbor Lodge is an ideal spot for a leisurely, summer visit. Picnicking is permitted. Each September the park is the site of the Applejack Festival.



Through August, the Morton mansion is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. A self-guided tour of the arboretum and grounds is free. Admission to the mansion is \$3 for adults and \$1 for children ages 6 to 15. Children age 5 and under are admitted free. A current Nebraska State Park Entry Permit is required for vehicles entering the park. For additional information call the park, (402) 873-7222.

(Most problem gamblers answered yes to at least 3 out of these 10 questions.)


